## RECIPES

## BARA BRITH (Recipe for Summer Show)

## Ingredients

450g / 1lb dried mixed fruit
$250 \mathrm{~g} / 90 \mathrm{z}$ brown sugar
$300 \mathrm{ml} / 1 / 2$ pint warm black tea
2 tsp mixed spice
$450 \mathrm{~g} / 1 \mathrm{lb}$ self-raising flour
1 free-range egg, beaten

## Method

In a large bowl soak the fruit and sugar in strained tea and leave overnight.
Next day preheat the oven to $170 \mathrm{C} / 325 \mathrm{~F} / \mathrm{Gas} 3$. Line a $900 \mathrm{~g} / 2 \mathrm{lb}$ loaf tin with baking parchment.
Mix the remaining ingredients into the fruit mixture and beat well.
Pour the mixture into the loaf tin and bake the oven and bake for $1 \frac{1}{2}$ hours or until a skewer inserted into the middle comes out clean.
